 CCRMA expanded offices and increased project development and toll operations staff



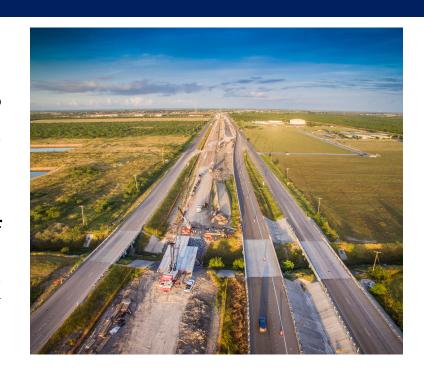
- Procured and secured GEC contracts eligible for Federal/State Funding for all phases of project development in Cameron County and Neighboring Counties

Significant Achievements in FY 2018

- Constructed and opened to traffic 550 GAP I within schedule and budget leaving only one GAP pending before entire road becomes Interstate 169
- CCRMA expedited and leads the development of the South Port Connector through environmental and design phases (key to Space X Infrastructure)
- Strategic Right of Way acquisition on projects, including SPI and East Loop
- CCRMA procured a group of vendors for Toll System Integration eligible to develop projects for future partnerships with RMA's and other Local Government agencies

- Designed and Implemented a new Toll Collection System for the Pharr International Bridge making it the first Regional Partnership of its kind
- Toll Operations kicked off partnership with Duncan Solutions for Collections

Financial Achievements in FY 2018

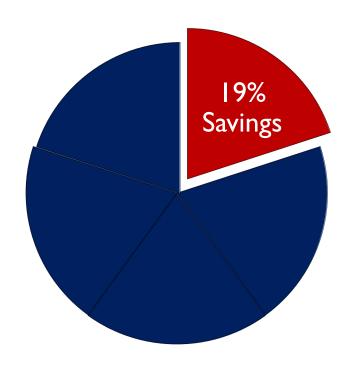
- CCRMA increased its Debt Reserves for toll bonds by fully funding its Rate Stabilization Fund with \$1.6M and increased its Renewal and Replacement fund by over \$500K
- Vehicle Registration Fee expected to be 2% above budgeted amount
- TRZ Revenue expected of \$570K more than a \$250K increase over budgeted amount
- Completed bond refunding transaction of 2010 VRF bonds creating a Net Present Value Savings of \$280K
- December 2017 S&P Global Long term Bond Rating on VRF Bonds AA-/Stable

Financial Achievements in FY 2018

- Total Administrative Revenues and Inflows above
 3% from budgeted amount
- Administrative Salaries and Benefits expected to be 5% less than budgeted amounts
- CCRMA is expected to realize a savings of 19% from budgeted items for administrative and office expenses
- Toll Operation Revenue increased 32% above budgeted amount
- Toll Operations realized a 9% reduction in salaries and benefits expense from budgeted amounts
- Toll Operations administrative and office expenses expected to be 9% less than budgeted amounts

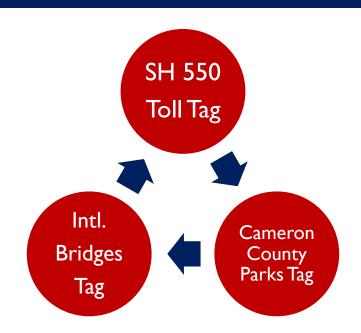

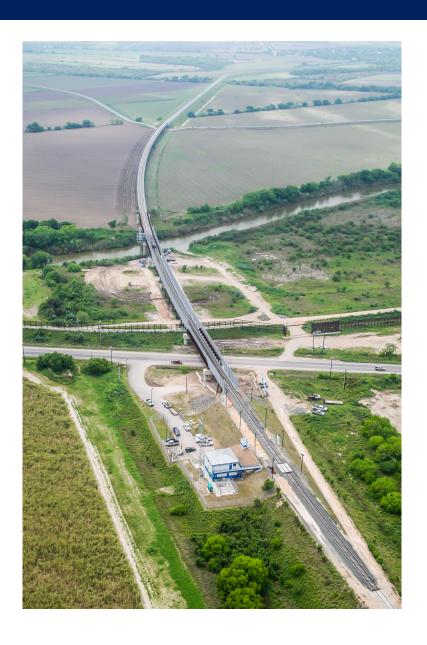
